Dr. Amanda Clinton was born in Alaska, United States. She has a degree in Psychology and an accredited School Psychologist. He earned his master's degree from the University of Washington and his doctorate from the University of Georgia.

She is currently the Senior Director of the Office of International Affairs of the American Psychological Association (APA). Before joining the APA, Dr. Clinton served as Professor of Psychology at the University of Puerto Rico, where she specialized in culturally relevant prevention programs, early childhood, social-emotional development, and bilingualism. Dr. Clinton has experience in community clinics, pediatric hospitals, public schools, academic settings, and public policy.

He was awarded a fellowship from the American Association for the Advancement of Science that allowed him to intern in the United States Congress, in the office of Senator Chris Murphy, where he helped write the Mental Health Reform Act of 2016 (passed as law titled "The Cure of the XXI Century" in 2017).

Dr. Clinton's academic work includes the publication of the book "Integrated Assessment of the Bilingual Child" and numerous articles and book chapters. She is associate editor of the Journal of Educational and Consulting Psychology (JEPC) and the Interamerican Journal of Psychology and has won several prestigious awards, including

a Fulbright Fellowship, an Overseas American States Organization Fellowship, and the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (SPSSI).
